#### How to See More Birds at Home

How many insects does a pair of chickadees need to raise one nest of chicks? How many would Violet-Green Swallows need? To answer that, grad students and volunteers completed a 3-year study. The answer for chickadees: approximately 5000 caterpillars or insects per nest. And VG Swallows? No studies so far, but at least double that number, because while chickadee and sparrow adults can eat seeds, swallow



adults-- like all land bird babies-- eat only insects. So if you love seeing birds like the Fox Sparrow above, and if you miss having feeders in your yard, here's a partial solution. Provide a habitat where feathered parents can feed their chicks and themselves naturally. Plant native trees and shrubs, then add in native wildflowers and a water source. Non-native trees of course have pests, but native birds generally don't find those critters tasty. A yard that is at least 70% native plants looks like home to our native tree nesters, because they don't have to fly off-site to find food. To this end, the North Olympic Wildlife Habitat Project, sponsored by the Olympic Peninsula Audubon Society, is hoping Parkwood will join all of Carlsborg and Sequim in qualifying our yards as Certified Wildlife Habitat. With our abundance of native trees and shrubs, Parkwood has a head start. Information on steps towards certification is at <a href="https://olympicpeninsulaaudubon.org/north-olympic-habitat-project.">https://olympicpeninsulaaudubon.org/north-olympic-habitat-project.</a> But whether or not you pursue certification, every native you plant—even in a pot--will bring you more birds and will give nestling chickadees, nuthatches, sparrows and others a better chance of survival.

## P.E.R.T Parkwood Emergency Response Team

Spring is here, the flowers are blooming, the heavy rains should be coming to a close. And remember, April showers bring May flowers which means it will not be long before we are going to have to water our gardens. Last year our water consumption in the park had gone up and there should be a report coming out from management in the near future reflecting this. What can we do to help? If your usage is over the monthly amount all the time, find out why. You could have a leak under your house, or your toilet is leaking, or you may have a hose leaking. These things are usually easy to fix and will save you money as well as water. As the park must report our water consumption to the state, and can be fined for over usage, those costs likely will be handed down to the consumer. You can help all of us in the park to avoid an increase in our water bills by being aware of overuse. It's easy to forget how little rain Sequim gets in a year, only about 15 inches, making us one of the driest places on the west coast. The population of Sequim has grown significantly in the past decade and that means more water is being pumped out of the ground. So, let's all be good stewards of our natural resources by checking our usage, kindly remind a neighbor of a forgotten running hose, etc. If you see any leaks around the park let management know. Together we can help keep our natural resources safe for future generations by being responsible for our environment. Goose.
