RAINDROPS AND RAINBOWS CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT 2025 BY: JANE NICHOLAS AND IDA DOMAZLICKY

December is a time of traditions and celebrations. One of those traditions is the Christmas Bird Count. It dates back to 1900 and is the longest-running citizen science project according to the Audubon Society. Each year birders pick a date between Dec. 14 and Jan. 5, and are assigned an area to count all the birds they see.

Each year our count area has included Parkwood, plus about a mile beyond to the south, north, and west. This area includes two ponds which are known hot spots for ducks.

December 15 was our day. As you know, weather in December is unpredictable. This year we prepared for rough weather since recent conditions had been quite blustery and wet. We were delighted to find daylight arrived drier, warmer and sunnier than expected. Throughout the day a light drizzle alternated with sufficient sun beams to provide rainbows to watch over us. It was a good day.

As darkness fell we tallied our results by dome light. Within the confines of Parkwood, this year's count was 21 species with 129 individual birds. The total count for all of our assigned area was 51 species with 629 individual birds. Two hundred and fifty of those birds were various species of waterfowl that we spied through a rising mist over the ponds. Compared to last year's total numbers (52 species, 808 individuals) we were down some, but actually this year was an average year as to the total number of birds, and last year was the outlier.

The top five birds in Parkwood this year were: Bushtits 34, Dark-eyed Juncos 25, House Finches 10, Chestnut-backed Chickadee 9, with Anna's Hummingbirds and Ruby-crowned Kinglets tied at 8 each. Also seen were three different species of sparrows, and 3 Cedar Waxwings which were no doubt looking for any berries still clinging to branches. The top birds overall were Mallards at 120, followed by 61 Canada Geese, 51 juncos, and 48 Bushtits. We drew a flush of raptors including a Merlin, American Kestrel, Sharp-shinned, Cooper's and a Red-tailed Hawk. The compiled historic data for all regions is available on the Audubon Society website at www.audubon.org/community-science/christmas-bird-count.

It will be interesting to see what birds January delivers. You can report any sightings on www.ebird.org. Providing fresh water whenever practical is helpful. The hummingbirds will be looking for a sip of nectar water too. I've resorted to a heated hummingbird feeder when the temperature drops. What plans do you have?

PARKWOOD UTLITIY INFORMATION

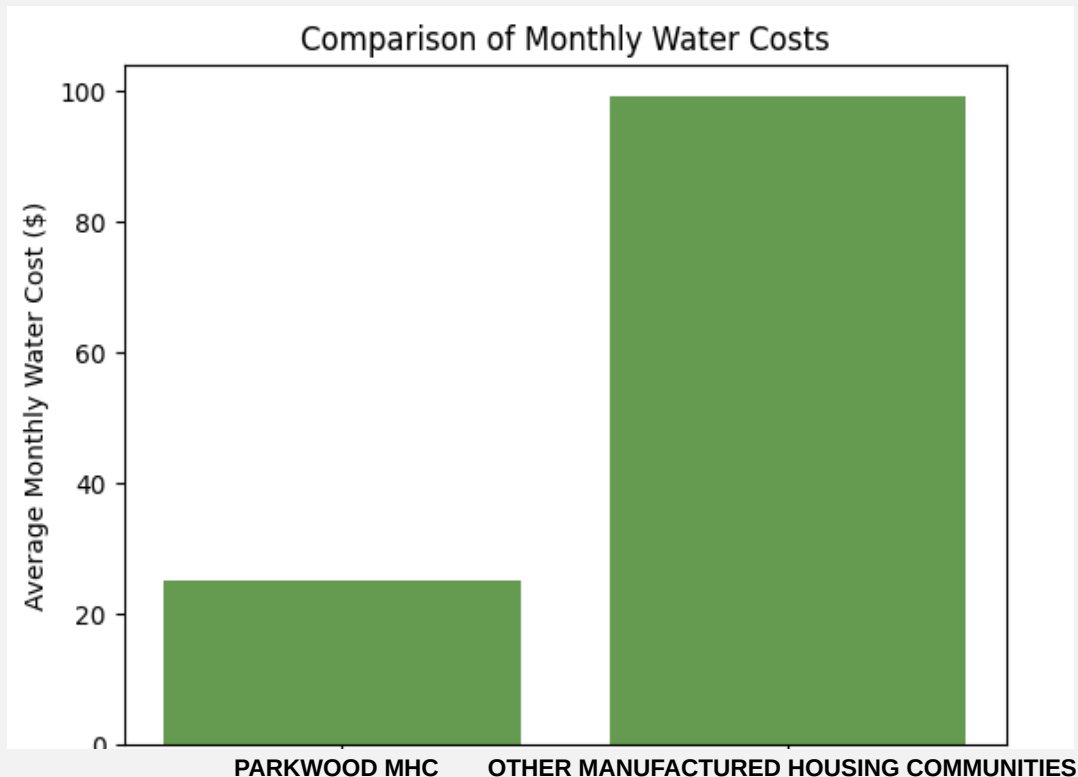
Here at Parkwood Housing Community we do our best to provide water to you at an affordable rate. We are happy to provide well water at a much more cost-effective rate than other communities on city water.

The increase to \$25 a month is to cover the servicing and maintenance of the well and septic system at Parkwood, along with the administrative fee of \$3.73. This is much less expensive than the average cost of water at most communities which averages at \$99 dollars a month, which is 74.4% lower rate than average.
